授業の概要 / Course description	<p>This course seeks to introduce students to some of the major thinkers and key intellectual trends in British philosophy and political theory from the early modern period up to the present. It examines the historical contexts in which different political and philosophical ideas developed in Britain, with a focus on the underlying connections between economic, moral, and social concerns that are evident in the articulations of such ideas in the main strands of British political thought. Overall, this course seeks to provide students with a broad overview of the ways in which British philosophy and political theory developed in response to specific social, historical, and economic forces, in addition to being shaped by particular religious and intellectual trends.</p> <p>An active learning approach will be employed (combined with introductory lectures), with an emphasis on classroom activities such as group discussion and debate, collaborative worksheets, and critical writing exercises.</p>
